The Irish Department of the Environment has stated in several reports the need to recycle better in order to expand markets, they aspire to be a benchmark for quality, both for their own consumption and for export.</p> <p>In Dublin, Ireland, a new wave of innovative businesses are revolutionising the food industry, by introducing food sharing. Introducing this initiative has led to the integration of sustainable food systems by conserving food resources, reducing waste, and reallocating a surplus of food to people in need.</p> <p>This includes donating and sharing food to those in need through food drives, food banks and soup kitchens by organisations such as The Simon Community, The Capuchin Day Centre, &amp; Crosscare.</p>
